How to Recognize a Publishing Scam and Avoid It

Tactics scammers often use:

- Appeal to our deepest desires
- Someone noticed my book and said it is good
- Book Scouts have flagged your book
- Use the title, "Literary Agent" or "Hollywood Executive"
- They will do the work for you
- Book price is too high. You need to republish it.

How do legitimate literary agencies work?

- Ask you to submit a book proposal or query letter
- Very clear instructions
- Agents tend to represent specific genres
- Don't ask to have you spend money.
- They get paid if they sell your book
- They will have a list of their clients, not just testimonials
- Link to the author's website or traditional publisher site

What can you do if you are contacted by one of these scammers?

- Don't let your emotions get in the way of your judgment
- If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is.
- If they say a book scout has flagged it, ask them to see what the book scout said or why they think this would be a good book for adaptation.
- Guarantee they have no idea what the book is about and in most cases, there are no legitimate book scouts.
- Demand they take you off of their email and call lists
- If they don't, you will report them to the Attorney General's office for violation of the Consumer Protection Code.
